Mortal Engines by Philip Reeve

Suitable for: Years 7 – 9


At the end of September, *Thunder City* is published, Philip Reeve's first return to the world of Mortal Engines in over a decade, so we thought going back to where it all began would be an appropriate choice for the Book of the Term.

Mortal Engines is a magnificent sci-fi dystopian classic, set in a world in which mechanised cities do battle across vast plains. From the opening set-piece in which the Traction City of London devours the small mining town of Salthook, the action never stops and Reeve's writing immerses the reader fully in his steampunk world of assassins and pirates, airships and shield walls. We follow Tom and Hester as they traverse this dangerous land and become embroiled in a plot to capture and use a terrifying weapon.

Mortal Engines is a gripping tale of action and adventure, and with four books in the original series, three gripping prequels, and now *Thunder City* to read, there is a whole world waiting to be discovered by lovers of sci-fi or dystopian fiction.



















STUDENT RECOMMENDATION


Over the next few weeks I am really looking forward to getting our lovely new shelves and seating in the library and displaying books beautifully so the covers sell themselves.

The Thieves' Gambit by Kayvion Lewis Suitable for Years 8 - 11

This fast-paced heist teen thriller is perfect for fans of *The Hunger Games*, Oceans 11 and Squid Game!

Rosalyn Quest is 17 and comes from a legendary family of thieves with one rule – trust no-one! She wants a normal life and enrols in a gymnastics summer camp, but when her mother is kidnapped the only way to get the money for her release is to win the Thieves' Gambit. And to win, the competitors will do whatever it takes. The challenges see the thieves travel across the globe, working together or against each other to complete and win each challenge. The winner of the Gambit gets to wish for whatever they like...


Will Rosalyn's archnemesis from school be a help or a hindrance? Where the others use violence, Ross uses her quick thinking and skills to outwit her opponents. Can she trust anyone, especially the handsome Devroe...

Our third SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT recommendation comes from our **Head of Year 11 and Teacher of PE, Mr Thomas**.



Expected Goals by Rory SmithSuitable for Years 9-11

Published by Mudlark/Harper Collins, 2022.

This book traces the history of the use of data in football from the late 1990s up to the present day. Bringing together contributions gathered from the Phillipines to London via Denmark it details how football analysts developed their work from the early days of the Opta Index.

Through the use of techniques similar to those used in Oakland in 2003 as evidenced in the film Moneyball (and hence the Red Sox/Liverpool buy in) clubs developed ever-more sophisticated approaches to tactics and the signing of players.

At clubs such as Midtjylland and Brentford this data-led approach resulted in them out-performing against their budgets. The term 'Expected Goals' was first used on British television by Arsene Wenger in November 2017 and has since become one of the most comprehensive measures of a team's performance.

What could be better, a book that celebrates both sport and mathematics!

Ruby and Lucas make a discovery buried in the snow.


How do they solve it when everyone is acting so strangely and someone is trying to silence them?

Want to read other stories like this? Try *Dear Scarlett, Murder at Twilight*, and *Murder in Midwinter*.


If you like Fleur Hitchcock, try authors Elle McNicoll or Robin Stevens.

Talking to Alaska by Anna Woltz (Year 7 New Chapters book) Suitable for Years 7 – 9

It only takes one day at their new school for Parker and Sven to become mortal enemies. Parker's had a terrible summer and just wants to be invisible, while Sven is desperate to make an impression and be known as anything other than 'that kid with epilepsy.'

When Parker discovers her beloved dog Alaska – who she had to give away last year – now belongs to Sven, she's determined to steal her back. Of course, that's much easier said than done...

Meanwhile, Sven is mortified when Alaska is brought to meet him wearing her fluorescent Assistance Dog vest. Having epilepsy feels like he has no control over his life anymore, so when Parker – face covered and in disguise – arrives in his bedroom at midnight to take Alaska back, there's something new to think about. But after spilling all his secrets to her, what'll happen if he uncovers her real identity?

Told in alternating chapters between the two characters, this is a heartfelt story about understanding others. It's a relatively short read, but Anna Woltz packs a lot in, including themes of bullying, trauma, and coping with life-altering situations, while the characters make unexpected discoveries about friendship — and a special discovery about Alaska too.
