
# KINGSHILL READS

## **BOOK OF THE TERM**




**Jelly** by Jo Cotterill Suitable for: Years 7 – 9

Last term we featured Onyeka and the Academy of the Sun by Tola Ogokwu, as we were fortunate enough to have a visit from the author in May. So, our guest this term will be **Jo Cotterill**, author of the brilliant Electrigirl series, but also the writer of this wonderful, empowering book about body image and self-confidence, *Jelly*.

The main character, Angelica – Jelly for short – is a 12-year-old who is known at school for being full of fun and laughter and energy, but who is actually incredibly nervous, anxious and riddled with insecurities. When Jelly's Mum's new boyfriend, Lennon, is the first to notice that Jelly is hiding her insecurities behind her larger than life persona, he encourages her to let the world see her for who she truly is and to have the confidence to believe in herself enough to take part in the forthcoming school talent show.




# **STUDENT RECOMMENDATION 1**

## **SCHOOL PRODUCTION**



Matilda by Roald Dahl Suitable for: Years 7 - 11

Matilda is the book that reminds me of the joy we all can find in reading. I loved reading it as a child and when it came out as a musical, with Tim Minchin writing the script and composing the music, I knew it would make a fabulous school production.

Matilda is an exceptional young person, but her parents think she's just a nuisance. They wanted a boy, but she's a girl. They are nasty, but she is honest. But most terribly, they want to watch TV whilst she wants to read! Matilda loves the power of stories, of words and of imagination. She knows that she is free to go anywhere and everywhere - if only in her mind.

Eventually she goes to school, but there she has to face Miss Trunchbull, a kidhating terror of a headmistress. When Matilda stands up to the Trunchbull she suddenly discovers she has a remarkable power with which to fight back. Her power is the power to make things happen with her mind - she makes things happen with the power of her imagination. Matilda the novel doesn't sugarcoat the dark and difficult trials one may face in life, but simultaneously teaches us to endure the tough times. Matilda meets Miss Honey - a teacher I hope everyone has had at least once in their lives. In Miss Honey's class she is nurtured and believed in and we see her remarkable mind blossom.



*Girl. Boy. Sea.* by Chris Vick Suitable for Years 8 - 10

This book grabs you from the get-go and the short sharp prose packs a punch in its simplicity and devastation. Then, before you know it, you are with Bill floating on an endless expanse of ocean with everything that makes him human stripped away, lost in a world where only survival matters.

When Bill rescues Aya everything changes and the story becomes about more than just survival as a relationship develops that is key to everything that makes this story so rich. As they find ways to communicate, trust grows and Aya's stories fill the endless hours as she begins to reveal a little of herself.


Clever writing and storytelling throw you around on stormy waves as Bill and Aya grow closer through sinister turns and the danger, wonder, despair and even hope of the vast ocean. #### What If? by Randall Munroe

Suitable for Year 7 – 11

I have always enjoyed finding out the answers to puzzling questions. I love this book as you can dip in and out of it or read it in one go if you wish. Each chapter is based around questions Randall Munroe has been sent through his website. He produces a stick figure webcomic on line (xkcd: Cell Organelles which is also great) and this has created a platform for followers who want him to find out the 'why and how' of interesting simple questions like 'How many Lego bricks would it take to build a bridge capable of carrying traffic from London to New York?'.

For those who know me they will not be surprised to find out my favourite chapter was 'What would happen if you made a periodic table out of cube shaped bricks where each brick was made of the corresponding element?'. Sadly, the answer is that although collecting things is fun, when it comes to chemical elements you do not want to collect them all, but at least I now fully understand why!


#### Why Don't Penguins Feet Freeze?

Suitable for Years 7 – 9


For easier questions another similar book that may suit younger readers is one of three produced by the New Scientist.

Split across three parts: departure, arrival and healing, the poems within each section correspond to the thoughts and emotions surrounding each section of a refugee's journey.


This book helped me feel, think and act towards people not like myself. It reminded me that we all come from different backgrounds and are dealing with different situations that are invisible to the people around us.

Cinderella is Dead by Kalynn Bayron (Year 9 New Chapters book) Suitable for Years 9-11

It's 200 years after Cinderella found her prince, but the fairy tale is over. Teen girls are now required to appear at the Annual Ball, where the men of the kingdom select wives based on a girl's display of finery. If a suitable match is not found, the girls not chosen are never heard from again.

Sixteen-year-old Sophia would much rather marry Erin, her childhood best friend, than parade in front of suitors. At the ball, Sophia makes the desperate decision to flee, and finds herself hiding in Cinderella's mausoleum. There, she meets Constance, the last known descendant of Cinderella and her step sisters.

Together they vow to bring down the king once and for all – and in the process, they learn that there's more to Cinderella's story than they ever knew . . .


## **STUDENT RECOMMENDATION 2**

My Family and Other Animals by Gerald Durrell Suitable for Years 8-11

This is an amazing book about Gerald Durrell (famous naturalist and the founder of Jersey Zoo) and his life growing up. He was born in England and one day his mother moved him and his family, including gun-mad Leslie, kind Margo, Larry the writer and Roger the dog to the Greek island of Corfu. There they meet a wonderful taxi driver called Spiros who helps them with everything - from finding a house, to day to day travel - and he becomes a loyal friend to the Durrell family.

Gerald explores the island observing its fascinating array of wildlife and you can really see the world through his eyes and understand his passion for the animals which he collects and stores in a variety of places across his house, much to his family's despair. I would definitely recommend this book to anyone!

Every student in Years 7 - 9 was given a free £10 book token to spend on any book of their choice from an incredible selection provided in a pop-up bookshop in our school library.

Our students were so enthusiastic in making their choices and the staff from Read for Good and the bookshop repeatedly commented on how polite, respectful and well-behaved the students were across the two days.

It was great to see friends discussing their book choices, with some selecting the same book to read together and others selecting different books in a series so they could swap them over when finished.

This was such a special event, and we were proud to be selected to take part. We hope the books are enjoyed at home and that, for some, this could even be the spark that ignites a life-long love of reading.

In further good news from the event, all of the change from each book token has gone into funding new books for our school library.

So, at the end of the two days, Mrs Hughes had a wonderful time selecting nearly £500-worth of brand-new contemporary fiction for Kingshill students to enjoy in the coming months.

A huge thank you needs to go to Mrs Hughes for facilitating the bookshop in the library for two days, in addition to our friends at Read for Good and Hereward Corbett at the Yellow-Lighted Bookshop in Tetbury for his knowledge, expertise and enthusiasm when working with our students throughout this unique event.
