I also want to mention our amazing Y11 students who began their final round of mock exams and their ongoing final practical assessments. They are nearly there with one further week to go – we are all rooting for your success.

Assemblies

This week, I had the pleasure of delivering our World Book Day assemblies on The Power of Reading. I focused on how reading nourishes us, helping us become a little bit cleverer and a little bit kinder. I also shared books that have shaped some incredibly influential readers. Barack Obama feels a deep sense of *pride* when reading Toni Morrison's Song of Solomon, while Malala Yousafzai sees her own *resilience* reflected in The Alchemist by Paulo Coelho and The Wonderful Wizard of Oz by Frank Baum. Meanwhile, Emma Watson speaks about the power of empathy, compassion, and *kindness* in books like The BFG by Roald Dahl and The Bell Jar by Sylvia Plath.

I ended with an important message—if some of our students don't see themselves as readers yet, they shouldn't close themselves off to the possibility. One day, they might just discover the books that will nourish and shape them in ways they never expected.



On a beautiful, sunny Tuesday, a group of students walked to Octavia's Bookshop as part of a World Book Day trip. Their challenge was to select a book for the school library and recommend it to others. Octavia spoke to the students about how to choose and promote books, and we were impressed by their enthusiasm and ability to engage in thoughtful, bookish conversations.

The students carefully assessed their options before making their final selections. Among the chosen titles were *The Last Bear* by Hannah Gold, *The Three Musketeers* (Graphic Novel), *Ottoline and the Yellow Cat* by Chris Riddell, and *Powerless* by Lauren Roberts, to name just a few.

Throughout the trip, students were a credit to Kingshill, demonstrating both politeness and engagement. Once they have finished reading their selected books, they will write reviews to be displayed alongside them on the library shelves. Each book will be marked with a special label showing it was student-recommended. Additionally, four students with the best reviews will win a £5 book token to spend in the shop!


UK Intermediate Maths Challenge


On Wednesday 29th January, some of our Y9 & Y10 students took part in the Intermediate Mathematics Challenge. The challenge is held across schools from the whole of the UK, with approximately the top 8% of students receiving a Gold certificate, the next 17% receiving a Silver & the next 25% receiving a Bronze.

The students did exceptionally well, achieving 1 Gold, 9 Silver and 28 Bronze Certificates. We are extremely proud of everyone who took part.

A special mention goes to Caitlin Z in Y10, who achieved 'Best in school', having achieved a gold certificate.

Summer Uniform

As the warmer months approach, students will have the option to wear their summer uniform starting from Tuesday, 1st April. To help families prepare, we will be holding a Pre-Loved Uniform Sale on Friday, 28th March, from 3:00 – 4:00pm, directly after school. This is a great opportunity to purchase uniform items at a reduced cost while also supporting sustainability.

The summer uniform consists of a navy blue polo shirt with the school logo. If students choose to wear a t-shirt underneath, it must be plain white. Grey, tailored knee-length shorts are also permitted, provided they are no more than two inches above the knee. Blazers and school jumpers are optional during this time but can be worn as extra layers for warmth if needed. Students who prefer to continue wearing their shirt and tie are welcome to do so.

We encourage families to take advantage of the uniform sale and ensure students are dressed comfortably for the warmer months ahead.
