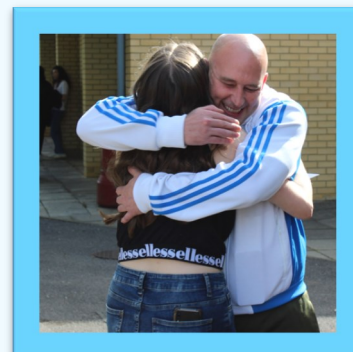

News from the Chair of Governors

At the first Full Governing Body Meeting of this academic year in October, Mr Johnson stood down as Chair of Governors having carried out the role for 11 years. I would like to record my sincere thanks to him for his dedication to the role throughout his time and for the many hours of work he put in on behalf of the whole school community. I feel privileged to be elected as his replacement and will endeavour to be as effective in the position as Mr Johnson was.

Although the Full Governing Body meeting took place in school, much of the work of the Governing Body has by necessity been conducted online, with meetings taking place via Microsoft Teams organised by our new Governance Professional (formerly Clerk to the Governors) Mrs Bryant, who I am delighted to welcome to the role.

For the benefit of new parents, I wish to reiterate the message from Mr Johnson in the last newsletter regarding the proposed new structure of the Governing Body.

As a consequence of regulations for Academies (as laid down by the DfE, Department for Education), Governors have been engaged in discussions about re-structuring the Governing Body into two new bodies — a Board of Trustees and a Board of Members.

The Board of Trustees will continue with all the usual work of the Governing Body and will retain the same responsibilities as Governors have at present. The Board of Members will be independent of the Trustees and will not be involved in the day-to-day business of the school. They will scrutinize the work of the Board of Trustees and be responsible for

Appointing or removing Trustees. The DfE describes Members as being “eyes on, hands off”. This structure is now a requirement for all Academy Trusts. We hope to implement this change before Easter in 2022.

- Buildings, Health and Safety Committee: 17th November 2021

- Finance, Audit and Risk Committee: 14th October 2021
- Chair’s Committee: 30th September 2021





The principal item at the Full Governing Body meeting of the 7th October 2021 was the Head's report, which provided Governors with details of the work of the school since the previous such report in July 2021. We were also given a detailed breakdown of the GCSE and BTEC grades awarded to the Year 11 pupils in the Summer of 2021. They are to be congratulated on their achievements and we wish them every success in the future. There was also an update on the arrangements that continue to be in place to mitigate the disruption caused by the ongoing Covid pandemic.

The various committees review policies annually and since the start of this academic year they include:

- Anti-bullying Policy
- Cover Policy
- Curriculum Policy
- Emergency Response Procedures and Lock Down Procedure
- Fire Procedure
- Green Procurement Policy
- Homework Policy

Dealing with all the above requires a lot of hard work and expertise on the part of our staff. My thanks go to them all.

Music and singing was of the highest calibre, with exceptional individual and group performances.

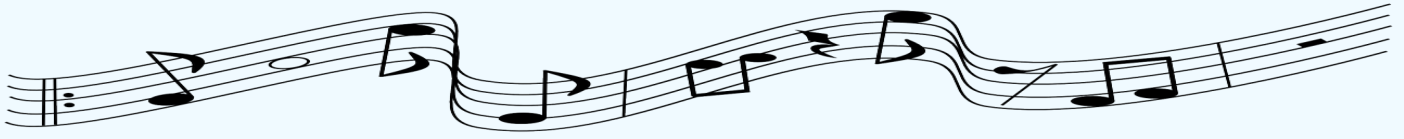
Some of the Year 8 pupils had learnt sign language and signed to “Merry Christmas Everyone”, they were absolutely brilliant!

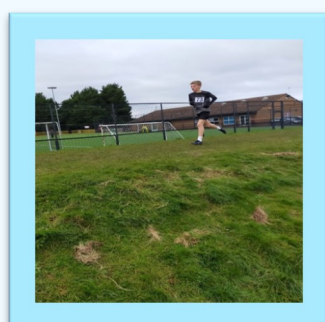

Year 7 Teambuilding Trip – Redwood, Slimbridge



On Tuesday 5th October 2021, we took a group of Year 7 pupils to Redwood for a day of exploration in the great outdoors. The site is run by the Ernest Cook Trust who offer educational opportunities and experiences to schools.

The first task of the day was orienteering. The instructor introduced pupils to map reading and took them for a short guided walk to check they knew how to use their maps and navigate around the woods – they all listened well and understood the task very quickly. The pupils split into small teams and set off - each map showed where numbered posts could be found. The teams were given a different sheet of target markers to find and they had to work together as a team and plan their routes (so they weren't going round in circles!).

After lunch the pupils were split into two groups to carry out the next tasks. They had to build a shelter using sticks, branches and standing trees. Working together, they had to work out the best way to make their shelters and which materials were best to use. There were some fantastic creations.

The students also toasted marshmallows in a fire pit constructed by the instructor. Some pupils toasted their marshmallows lightly and others were convinced that they needed to toast them till they were black!

All the pupils threw themselves into the activities and worked very well together. We were lucky that the forecasted high winds did not arrive and we only had light rain the night before – a little mud never hurt anybody!

It was a pleasure working with the pupils and spending the day outside in such a beautiful setting.

Talented Year 10 Art Pupils win competition

Ruby Pritchett 10B has won the Glorious Cotswold Grasslands Art competition. This competition was open to 11-19 year olds based in and around the Cotswolds. Competitors were asked to create a piece of art work which celebrates the beauty of meadows, their wildflowers and wildlife to encourage the restoration and creation of more wildflower meadows.

The judges found her work uplifting and loved the inclusion of wildflowers such as wild carrot and oxeye daisies. The inclusion of seed pods and seed dispersal is also a great nod to the seed collecting work carried out by judge Anna Field and her colleagues from the Glorious Cotswold Grasslands project.

Aardman Animator Jim Parkyn said, 'Ruby has captured grasslands in a rather 1950's print style that I like very much. Her use of blank space and shape is very appealing.'

Ellie Rowlands 10D was also named as the close runner up - the judges loved her colour use, composition and the mix of wildflowers included in her painting.

Both Ruby and Ellie have received a place on the model-making workshop with Jim Parkyn and their work is going to be featured in an online gallery, physical exhibition and as a feature in the Cotswold Area Of Natural Beauty's online publication Cotswold Lion.

Ruby and Ellie's art work will be exhibited at Nature in Art Gallery & Museum for 3 weeks over the Easter Holidays 2022!

Nature in Art is the world's first museum and art gallery dedicated to art inspired by nature. The director of the gallery and museum is thrilled to exhibit the submitted artworks and will be creating bespoke art activity days, displays and events inspired by the artworks and the Glorious Cotswold Grasslands project.

Year 9

Design Technology

This year, we have introduced a new topic to the Year 9 Design Technology rotation.

Pupils have been given the opportunity to explore Photography alongside the different DT disciplines; Textiles, 3D Design and Food.

We began by looking at Textiles and Photography. Pupils took portraits and then, inspired by artists such as Jose Romussi, they

manipulated their photos

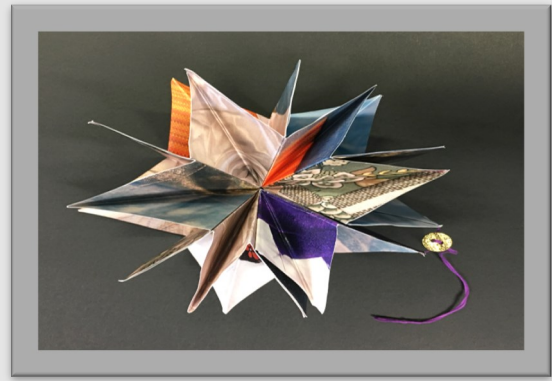
by stitching them onto the portrait.



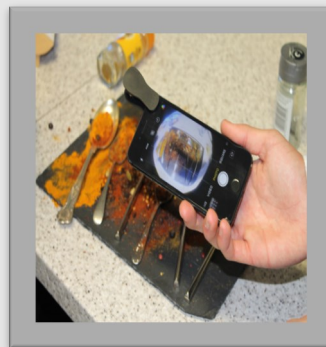
We continued with the theme of textiles, photographing fabrics up close, this time the outcome is presented as a 3D sculpture.

We addressed colour theory and planned a photo shoot, by drawing intended outcomes before working in small groups, to produce still life setups of fruits and vegetables. These outcomes are then taken into an editing programme called Lightroom. Pupils can edit and manipulate their images so as to refine and enhance their own unique final outcomes. Homework tasks are designed to be challenging, thus giving pupils an idea of what to expect at GCSE for Design Technology subjects and Photography. Pupils have risen to these challenges and produced impressive results.





Continuing with the theme of food, we looked at arranging and styling spoons and spices, again these images are taken into the Lightroom for further editing.

Christmas Cookies



Ingredients

- 100 grams** **Unsalted Butter**
(softened at room temperature)
- 100 grams** **Caster Sugar**
- 1** **Free-Range Egg (lightly beaten)**
- 1 teaspoon** **Vanilla Extract**
- 275 grams** **Plain Flour**
- 400 grams** **Icing Sugar to decorate**
- 4 tablespoons** **Water**
- 3 drops** **Food Colourings Add Edible Glitter**



Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 190C/375F/Gas 5. Line a baking tray with greaseproof paper.**
- 2. Cream the butter and sugar together in a bowl until pale, light and fluffy.**
- 3. Beat in the egg and vanilla extract, a little at a time, until well combined.**
- 4. Stir in the flour until the mixture comes together as a dough.**
- 5. Roll the dough out on a lightly floured work surface to a thickness of 1cm/½in.**
- 6. Using biscuit cutters or a glass, cut biscuits out of the dough and carefully place onto the baking tray. To make into Christmas tree decorations, carefully make a hole in the top of the biscuit using a straw.**
- 7. Bake the biscuits for 8-10 minutes, or until pale golden-brown. Set aside to harden for 5 minutes, then cool on a wire rack.**
- 8. For the icing, sift the icing sugar into a large mixing bowl and stir in enough water to create a smooth mixture. Stir in the food colouring. Carefully spread the icing onto the biscuits using a knife and sprinkle over the glitter. Set aside until the icing hardens.**

Making a Snow Globe



What you will need.

*Screw-top jars
Miniature figures, such as ornaments and cake decorations
Artificial foliage
Clear bottle tops, optional
Epoxy adhesive
Distilled water
Glycerine*



Position your figurine

Remove the lid from your jar and find out where you want to place your figurine.

Model it in different positions and try the jar over top. Once you have found the right pose, apply your adhesive sealant to the bottom of the figurine. Then, press the figurine down onto the lid, and hold it for about 2-5 seconds depending on the size.

Let it dry

It could take up to 24 hours, but check your glue packaging for drying times. Find a place to set it where it won't be disturbed. Make sure the figurine on your lid is nice and secure before proceeding.

Fill the jar with water.

Bottled water is ideal and will be clearer. Leave a little room at the top for glycerin, glitter and space for your figurine. Add the glycerin. Use a few drops to about a teaspoon, depending on how big your jar is.

***Pour in some glitter.** Using plastic glitter, sprinkle 1-2 teaspoons into the water.*

Seal the lid.

Keeping the glass jar right side up, just place your lid onto the top of the jar, and seal it. If there's any extra water, it might leak a little, but that's okay. Turn it over gently and see if there are any leaks. Check for extra space at the top, too, and turn the jar back over and add a little more water if needed.

Shake it up.

Shake your snow globe gently and enjoy your lovely craft! Display.
